Teaching & Learning Committee

This term has been extremely busy in all areas of the curriculum. In September, we introduced our new phonics scheme, Ready Steady Phonics. All staff received training on our INSET day, ensuring that Early Years (Treetops) and Key Stage One (Class One) were ready to implement the scheme as soon as the children started back. As a staff, we have been impressed with the children's progress and their enthusiasm to learn. Ready Steady Phonics provides resources for reading, spelling and handwriting and children have been actively engaged and illustrated pleasing results in all areas.

Maths has also seen lots of change, particularly with the whole school adopting the White Rose Scheme and mastery approach. Mrs Tench and I have joined a local Maths Hub, where we have had the opportunity to learn from maths specialists and bring new initiatives back to school. So far, we have introduced journals into our maths lessons, which allow children to illustrate their maths knowledge in a variety of ways, helping them with their reasoning and problem solving skills. The specialist also visits us in school, supporting staff with planning and delivery of the curriculum and preparation for Ofsted. We are aiming to increase oracy in maths, make the use of our working walls more consistent and develop how we use manipulatives.





ELSA and Nurture Groups I have been a teaching assistant at Duddon St Peter's for fifteen years now, but for the last few years I have also worked as an ELSA - Emotional Literacy Support Assistant.

There will always be children in schools facing life challenges that can detract from their ability to focus on their learning and some children will need support to increase their emotional literacy. In the past few years, this number has been increasing, due to a variety of social pressures.

I have been trained as an ELSA in how to support children and continue to be supported by educational psychologists. We recognise that children learn better and are happier if their emotional needs are addressed.

I am allocated time each week to deliver interventions, either on a 1-1 basis or with small groups of children. Not all schools deliver emotional support and I feel we are very lucky to have this facility, although it is becoming busier and busier!

In ELSA sessions the aim is to provide support on many emotional needs including;

Anxiety, Self esteem, Recognising emotions, Social skills, Anger management, Friendship skills, Loss and bereavement.

ELSA is not there to fix problems but to provide support in a respectful, nurturing, child friendly space where children can talk honestly and share their feelings and worries.

SAFEGUARDING: Safeguarding is an important responsibility of the Governing Body. It includes ensuring that children are kept safe in school and around its environment, checking that relevant risk assessments are completed for all trips and residential visits and also for monitoring mental health.

Ofsted visits always have a safeguarding focus in any inspection and will rigorously question whether all staff and governors have received safeguarding training and that appropriate and up to date DBS checks are being maintained.

This term, we have set up and conducted a safeguarding audit, that will now be checked on an annual basis, and which details all actions in the different areas of safeguarding.

The school's Safeguarding Lead is Paul Hudson and the Deputy Safeguarding Lead is Claire Entwistle. If you have any concerns, you are able to contact them or myself to discuss them.

I have returned to school this term to continue in my tutoring role with various children, mainly the younger ones but three older ones as well. With the older ones I am concentrating on Literacy skills, extending and improving sentence construction, developing vocabulary sequencing of ideas to give their writing interest and flow. They are very responsive and though we only have a short time for our one - to- one sessions, the results are pleasing. With the younger children, I have helped with comprehension, (completing answers to questions looking at the words in the question) numeracy, science (revising and learning vocabulary) and reading skills.

As always it is rewarding and fun. I have also taken on the role of overseer with the School Council. We haven't met yet but Paul has told me they are eager and keen! I am aiming to continue these contacts with the children for the full academic year.
