

The Vicar writes...

Who was St Peter....

Saint Peter, also known as Simon Peter, is one of the most prominent figures in Christianity. As one of the Twelve Apostles of Jesus Christ, he is revered for his leadership, faith, and the unique role he played in the early Church. His legacy endures as the "rock" upon which the Church was built, as described in the Bible.

Saint Peter was born in Bethsaida, a fishing village in Galilee. He worked as a fisherman alongside his brother Andrew, who introduced him to Jesus. Known for his impulsive and passionate nature, Peter quickly became one of Jesus' closest disciples. His name "Peter," derived from the Greek word "Petros," meaning "rock," was given to him by Jesus as a symbol of the foundational role he would play in the Church. Peter witnessed many pivotal moments in Jesus' ministry, including walking on water (albeit briefly), the Transfiguration, and the Last Supper. Despite his devotion, Peter famously denied Jesus three times during the Good Friday —a moment that showcases human vulnerability even as he later reaffirmed his faith and leadership after the Resurrection. After Jesus' ascension, Peter became a central figure in the spread of Christianity. He preached, performed miracles, and eventually travelled to Rome, where he was martyred under Emperor Nero's persecution. Tradition holds that Peter was crucified upside-down, as he felt unworthy to die in the same manner as Jesus.

"Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time." (1 Peter 5:6) - A reminder of the virtues of humility and trust in divine timing.

"Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you." (1 Peter 5:7) - Words of comfort for those enduring hardships, emphasizing God's care and compassion.

Saint Peter's enduring legacy lies in his humanity and transformation. He exemplifies the journey from flawed beginnings to spiritual greatness. As the first pope in Catholic tradition, he symbolizes the authority and unity of the Church. His writings and actions continue to inspire both scholars and believers, reinforcing the message of redemption and the power of unwavering faith. Saint Peter's life stands as a testament to the impact of

faith, humility, and perseverance. His story reminds us that even in moments of doubt or weakness, spiritual strength and purpose can prevail.

His experiences when serving with the Vice Squad were a revelation and shock to most of us. His warnings about online abuse of young children were very worrying and he urged us all to talk to our grandchildren about the dangers and how to avoid them. It was interesting to hear him say that children often take advice from grandparents rather than parents. A big responsibility for us all in that category.

Parts of his talk about prostitution and pornography were at times distressing and very sad. This was a very different evening for our group but brought to our attention areas of crime we knew nothing about.

As usual we finished the evening with home made refreshments.

Father's Day

Father's Day is held on the third Sunday of June in the United Kingdom.

So....it takes place on Sunday 19 June this year.

It is a day to celebrate fathers and father figures like carers or grandfathers.

Mother's Day has been celebrated for hundreds of years, but Father's Day is a little more recent.

The day probably originated in the US and there are several stories of how it started.

The most popular, and likely account, is that it started with a woman called Sonora Louise Smart in Washington.

After her mother died in childbirth with her sixth child, her dad brought up the family.

In 1909, Sonora hear'd a speech in church about Mother's Day and thought dads should also be celebrated.

Several local clergymen accepted the idea and it's believed that 19 June 1910 was the first unofficial Father's Day.



In **Thailand**, Father's Day is celebrated on the birthday of the hugely admired late King Bhumibol Adulyadej, on 5 December, who is considered the Father of the Nation.

It is traditional to wear yellow.

Fathers and grandfather's also used to be given a Canna flower though that isn't as popular now.

In **Mexico**, Father's Day or Día del Padre is also celebrated on the third Sunday in June.

Every year in Mexico City there's a 13 mile race called Carrera Día del Padre or Father's Day race. Children can also take part and run alongside their dads.

In Germany instead of spending time with their children fathers or väter often go off in groups for hiking trips, sometimes pulling wagons full of drink and food.

In **Nepal** children often give sweets as presents. Sons and daughters sometimes receive blessings from their fathers. Those whose fathers have died, go to a pilgrimage site and perform shraddha, the holy ritual in remembrance.

In France, Fête des Pères was traditionally a Catholic celebration, but it was reinvented for commercial reasons in the 1900s. Now all sorts of gifts are given on the day including roses. In France it is traditional to give red roses to your father if he is alive, but if your father has died white roses are laid on their grave.

Pandora's box and many other stories, ideas and helpful floral hints were amusingly told by Carron White our demonstrator. She arranged 5 designs, all different in many ways. Two of these were completed without floral foam which can be difficult for a demonstration where the designs are then raffled. The 1st was in a plastic ice cream container with tape in a grid at the top and the other one was also taped and was in a glass mixing bowl.

Another design was a wreath ring made into a table design and containing some died multicolour roses. A very dark and dramatic arrangement seemed to be the favourite mainly with spider chrysanthemums. Her final design looked bridal and contained a large orchid and pale pink and peach flowers. Her purple designs had a good background from the curtains in the Edna Rose room, these usually clash with most designs.

Pilgrimages

Durham Cathedral's imposing stone structure loomed large through the evening mist. We'd not planned to stop there; our destination was Newcastle on Tyne, but the building struck an immediate chord with us both. We quickly decided to stay in the city

and almost as quickly, found a nearby

Travelodge.

Our original objective was to reconnoitre the route of Hadrian's Wall, with a view to walk the 73 miles long distance path the following Spring. We'd already checked out the Carlisle side, staying at the quaintly named Twice Brewed Inn. But the Cathedral seemed to good to miss. Built between 1093 and 1133 it's the largest example of Norman architecture in the UK and holds the Shrines of St. Cuthbert and The Venerable Bede. Built on high ground in a meander of the river Tyne, and in constant use since it's construction, it's always been a major tourist attraction. Many years after



we'd visited it became a famous location in many Harry Potter films.

The Bishop's Throne is said to be one inch higher than that of the Pope's - making it the highest throne in Christendom. Internally the building has so many things to see that it's probably the thickest (and heaviest) guide book I've ever purchased with it's 900 year history makes fascinating reading; Oliver Cromwell and Henry 8th being two high (or perhaps low) points. It's a vast sprawling place, becoming a World Heritage Site in

It's a vast sprawling place becoming a World Heritage Site in 1986, and when the 10 bells in the central tower are rung the sound echoes for miles around.

"Half church of God, half castle 'gainst the Scots' Sir Walter Scott once wrote in a poem. We only spent one morning there - Hadrian's Wall and the heady delights of a Saturday night in Newcastle centre, were calling us. So we only scratched the surface. It would have repaid another and much longer visit.

On a second visit to St Ives when we had Louis as a puppy (He is the little white dog who you may see on Sunday mornings) we visited the nearby village of Zennor. You can catch a local bus from St Ives or if you like you can walk the old coffin trail to Zennor Church where you can see The Zennor Mermaid carved into a chair

I think you would enjoy visiting these churches just as much as we did.

TALES FROM THE GRAVEYARD JUNE 2025

WEEDING FRONT PATH

Despite there being a dry spell through May, the weeds in the graveyard have continued to grow. A concerted effort from John P and Bill in the last couple of weeks have now cleared the front path with several wheelbarrow loads of debris taken away.



The two photos left and below show John and Bill in action, on their knees, clearing the weeds from between the flagstones. The next job will be to fill these gaps with a cement grout to prevent regrowth of the weeds. The bottom photo shows the path in the weed-free state.

A few

people have asked about the fact the daffodils are left in place for a while after flowering. After the flowers fade, it is recommended they are left at least six weeks for the leaves to go yellow and die naturally. By leaving them all for this period, it enables to bulbs to store energy and produce a quality bloom next year. They will all be cleared up by the end of May.





Whilst John and Bill were weeding, Peter Ryan was working with a strimmer in the front grassed area to clean up the weeds and grass around the graves in this, the oldest section of the graveyard.

Keeping abreast of the grass cutting is the most important task at the present time. The team have several power driven mowers available, so if any of you have a few hours to spare on a Wednesday afternoon, please come along to help.
