

The Vicar writes...

St Luke the Healer: Physician of Body and Soul

Feast Day: October 18

St Luke, the beloved physician and evangelist, holds a special place in the hearts of Christians—not only as the author of the Gospel that bears his name and the Acts of the Apostles, but also as a symbol of healing, compassion, and faithful witness.

Luke the Physician

Luke is the only Gospel writer who was not Jewish by birth. A Gentile and a doctor by profession, he brought a unique perspective to the life and ministry of Jesus. His Gospel is filled with stories of healing—both physical and spiritual. From the woman with the issue of blood to the ten lepers, Luke's account emphasizes Jesus' care for the sick, the marginalized, and the outcast.

It's no surprise that Luke is the patron saint of physicians, surgeons, and artists. His writings reflect a deep concern for human suffering and a profound understanding of God's mercy.

A Gospel of Compassion

Luke's Gospel is often called the "Gospel of the Poor" or the "Gospel of Mercy." He alone tells the parables of the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son—stories that highlight God's boundless compassion and the call to love our neighbour.

His attention to detail and his orderly account suggests a careful, thoughtful mind—perhaps the mind of a doctor who observed not only symptoms but also the soul.

Healing in the Church Today

St Luke's legacy continues in the Church's ministry of healing. Whether through pastoral care, hospital chaplaincy, or the quiet prayers of a parish, the spirit of Luke's Gospel lives on. His example reminds us that healing is not just about curing illness—it's about restoring wholeness, dignity, and hope. St Luke is one of my favourite gospels because it holds the tension together a gospel for everyone with the intent for faith to bring healing to all.

As we celebrate St Luke, may we be inspired to bring Christ's healing love to a hurting world—through our words, our actions,

Church Fundraising



This year, William's Wood chose St Andrew's and St Peter's Churches as beneficiaries for their charitable output. What this means is that for every member of the congregation who avails themselves of William's Wood products or services, ranging from firewood, bean poles through to attendance at events or activities like apple pressing or family school holiday activities, a percentage will be given to the Churches on April 5th 2026 and we can claim gift aid too.

Firewood is sold, certified as Ready to Burn under Certificate WS4344, in single nets or multiples. The current log net price is £5.25 inc VAT at 5% and we are given 50p per net. Collect your wood from William's Wood or for orders 8 nets or more, in multiples of 8, delivery to the villages of Tarvin and Duddon are inclusive. 40 nets is a tight stacked cubic metre.

They don't deliver tipped bulk loads because nobody really looks forward to receiving and dealing with a pile of logs on the driveway, and the drivers will stack the nets wherever you want as long as it is easily accessible from the road with a sack truck.

Even if you don't burn firewood yourself but know someone who does, as long as they mention the Churches at purchase, the donation will be made.

Well, in 2018, Brenda and I were lucky enough to spend 3 weeks touring NZ in a motorhome. We also visited Singapore; plus we motorhomed for a further 3 weeks in Australia. So, lots of fertile opportunities to visit various religious locations as well as other places some of which could well feature in future articles.


Still no H?.....how about 234 HER-EFORD Street, Christchurch, NZ; the location of The Cardboard Cathedral.....yes, a large building actually made from cardboard.

Seven years earlier, in 2011, Christchurch experienced a devastating magnitude 6.3 earthquake. More than 80% of the buildings were destroyed or damaged, and,



sadly, 185 people lost their lives. A poignant sculpture of 185 white painted wooden chairs stand quietly close to the Cathedral in their memory.

We experienced several minor earthquakes when we were there, and they are very worrying to the uninitiated. We also witnessed pavements being lifted by red hot magma and underwent a tsunami safety drill (basically, run like billyo!). It's a country that cer-





The 2011 earthquake had brought down the spire of the Anglican Cathedral in a few seconds and NZ's relaxed culture meant very little repair work had been done by 2018. However, a

team of international experts had started work within weeks of the calamity, and within 2 years, an earthquake proof foundation was in place on a new "transitional" cathedral site. Next the cardboard walls were assembled. Long cylinders of laminated veneer lumber (a type of plywood) were covered by thick cardboard. This had to be made wa-



terproof and fireproof - no easy task with such an innovative material, but they found a way. The colourful Trinity Window was another innovation. The coloured images were printed on the glass surfaces and then fired and fused into them. The walls were raised in only 6 months and the Dedication Service followed in Summer 2013.

Inside the building it's remarkably light and warm, with the sunshine streaming brightly throughout the building. We attended the 10.30 am Sung Eucharistic service and then joined the official tour of the buildings. Lunch was spent in the Original Sin restaurant nearby, named after Adam and Eve's transgressions in the Garden Of Eden. I've never been in a restaurant since with such extravagant and over the top wall and ceiling decoration. This is an Italian diner with dancing between the courses.....so we lingered for quite some time. The day was rounded off with punting on the River Avon, which runs through Christchurch. We dragged



our weary bones back to the motorhome and decided to stay on the city campsite for one more night. There was still so much to see in the immediate vicinity, and we still had the two islands of NZ to explore. And boy, did we explore!!

A Service of Promises

On 16 August, in the Bruen Chapel of St Andrews, Adam conducted a beautiful Church of England service, probably not known to many and recognised in the main for same sex blessings. This then formed the basis for a ceremony, Celtic in origin, in which fiancéd couples pledge their commitment to each other and is still practised today in Scotland.

My daughter Katy and her partner Chris got engaged in May but are not planning to marry for a couple of years and they wanted to demonstrate their future intention, particularly for a couple of elderly grandparents. The service contained prayers, a hymn, individual promises and two acts of symbolism.

In the Church of England, the lighting of a unity candle

during a wedding ceremony is a common and symbolic ritual where two individual candles are used to light a larger central candle, representing the joining of two people and families into a new, unified life together. On this occasion the familial candles were lit by Joyce and George as the maternal and paternal grandparent and family elders, from which Katy and Chris together lit a third candle to begin their new family together.

Whilst their favourite song 'Lifetime' was played everyone participated in binding the couple's hands together and this symbolic action was to reinforce their commitment to each other.



The dictionary definition of handfasting is 'to engage (someone) to be married' and the word derives from the Old Norse term 'handfesta' which meant 'strike a bargain by joining hands'. Handfasting is said to originate in pre-Christian times, but this isn't very well-documented. It was popular in the Middle Ages when it represented the engagement of a couple, or a sort of common-law marriage by consent and handfasting is now a popular part of wedding ceremonies

Adam also thoughtfully incorporated a naming ceremony for their two young sons, Freddie and Archie which completed the service as prayers and promises were made for the children by family members. The boys were thrilled to receive baptismal teddies as a reminder of this special day.

TALES FROM THE GRAVEYARD OCTOBER 2025

HEDGES AND ASHES



As we get towards the end of the hedge cutting season, its worth reflecting on the amount that has to be done in this respect. The photo on the left shows Linda and Mark finishing off the hedge to the north of the graveyard, by Ardern Close area. This is the highest of the hedges, and does require a safe approach to the use of ladders. Still to be cut is the holly hedge by the war memorial, which is trimmed mid-October prior to the Remembrance Service .This year the service is on 9th No-

vember. Hedge and

shrub trimming also gives the team a chance to indulge in some topiary. The photo on the right shows the work of Martin and Neil to produce a perfect rectangular shape on a holly bush in the middle of the graveyard.

However, in the light of long term planning, it is recognised that there are only another 22 plots for ashes available in the existing area, so work is due to start later

in the year on producing an ashes



burial section on the north side of the wall. This is the opposite side to that already used for ashes burial, and as shown on the photo on the left. For each ashes burial point, there will be a section for a memorial and flowers, etc., a burial area, then a narrow footpath between the wall and the existing gravestones, which is habitually muddy throughout winter. This first phase should initially give another 36 ashes burial plots for the future.
